

OVERVIEW





The Film Foundation was created in 1990 by Martin Scorsese to address the urgent need to protect our cinematic history. Twenty—eight years later, Scorsese and the foundation's board of directors work to ensure that films from every era, genre, and region are saved for future generations. Through robust preservation, exhibition, and educational programs, the foundation preserves numerous films each year, making them available for hundreds of screenings, and educates millions of young people about the language of cinema. The commitment and generosity of our board and supporters make all of this possible.

PRESERVATION AND RESTORATION

The Film Foundation has restored over 825 films to date in collaboration with our partner archives and studios. In 2018, 45 projects were completed with TFF support, including Edgar G. Ulmer's noir cult classic DETOUR, Nietzchka Keene's ethereal interpretation of the Brothers Grimm fairy tale THE JUNIPER TREE, two versions of THE KILLERS (Robert Siodmak's 1946 version and Don Siegel's version from 1964), Ronald Neame's military drama TUNES OF GLORY, and many others.

WORLD CINEMA PROJECT

The Film Foundation's World Cinema Project has restored 35 films from 23 countries, to date, including four films restored in 2018: ENAMORADA (1946, d. Emilio Fernández), PIXOTE (1980, d. Hector Babenco), PRISIONEROS DE LA TIERRA (1939, d. Mario Soffici), and CHRONIQUE DES ANNÉES DES BRAISE (1975, d. Mohammed Lakhdar—Hamina), the second film restored as part of the African Film Heritage Project.

EXHIBITION

Over 500 screenings of TFF—supported restorations were presented internationally at archives, festivals, museums, repertory theaters, and other venues in 2018. MoMA presented "Martin Scorsese Presents Republic Rediscovered: New Restorations from Paramount Pictures," 30 films selected by Scorsese from the Republic Pictures library. ENAMORADA had its world restoration premiere at the Cannes Film Festival, introduced by Scorsese and Olivia Harrison of The Material World Foundation. At the TCM Classic Film Festival, DETOUR and TUNES OF GLORY had their restoration premieres, and the Egyptian Theatre presented four nitrate prints, thanks to the projection booth retrofit project supported by the HFPA, TCM, TFF, and the Academy Film Archive.

EDUCATION

In 2018, TFF announced a new *Story of Movies* curriculum, "Portraits of America: Democracy on Film." The program explores films that focus on Americans, both fictional and real, whose stories embody and reflect the ideals and challenges of our democratic society. TFF also continued support for NYU's Audiovisual Preservation Exchange (APEX) in Brazil and Restoration Film Schools in Italy and India. TFF partnered once again with the Association of Moving Image Archivists (AMIA) to host two Film Projection Workshops—a Level 1 workshop in Chicago and a Level 2 workshop in Boston.

FILM PRESERVATION & RESTORATION



DETOUR

1945 | d. Edgar G. Ulmer

Restored by the Academy Film Archive and The Film Foundation in collaboration with Cinémathèque Royale de Belgique, The Museum of Modern Art, and the Cinémathèque Française. Restoration funding provided by the George Lucas Family Foundation.

Down and out New York nightclub musician Al Roberts recounts his tale of woe at a roadside diner. On his way to join his girlfriend, Sue, in Los Angeles, he hitches a ride with con man Charles Haskell. When Haskell mysteriously dies, Al fears he will be blamed if he goes to the police, and assumes the dead man's identity instead. Al runs into a new set of troubles when he picks up a hitchhiker, Vera, who knew Haskell. Vera uses Al's lies against him and blackmails him. Al must find a way to get out of Vera's clutches if he ever hopes to be reunited with Sue.

The primary source for this 4K digital restoration of DETOUR was a 35mm nitrate composite print with French and Flemish subtitles from the Cinémathèque Royale de Belgique. A 35mm safety duplicate picture negative from The Museum of Modern Art (MoMA) was used as a compositing source to remove the subtitles. Digital painting techniques were used when the MoMA source did not contain the necessary frames. One shot was missing in both the Cinémathèque Royale and MoMA sources. This shot was incorporated into the restoration from a 35mm safety composite print from the Cinémathèque Française. Roundabout Entertainment in Burbank, CA, completed the digital image restoration. The audio was restored by Audio Mechanics, also in Burbank, using three 35mm prints and one 16mm print. DETOUR had its world restoration premiere at the TCM Classic Film Festival.



THE MASQUE OF THE RED DEATH

1964 | d. Roger Corman

Restored by the Academy Film Archive and The Film Foundation, with funding provided by the George Lucas Family Foundation.

Based on the Edgar Allan Poe short story of the same name, THE MASQUE OF THE RED DEATH features Vincent Price as Prince Prospero. After kidnapping a local family of peasants, he sequesters himself and a few chosen aristocrats in his castle to avoid the 12th century plague, known as "The Red Death." While in his fortress, they worship Satan and play cruel games that involve torture. When a red–cloaked figure appears, Prospero believes it to be Satan himself, but soon learns the truth about his mysterious guest.

The 4K restoration of THE MASQUE OF THE RED DEATH was based on the 35mm original picture negative, on loan to the Academy from MGM Studios, a 35mm British Technicolor print, and the 35mm original sound elements. Missing censored scenes from the American release were replaced using shots from a 35mm Technicolor print from the Dante/Davison Collection at the Academy Film Archive. Scanning and image restoration was completed by Roundabout Entertainment in Burbank. The audio was restored by Audio Mechanics in Burbank.





QUEEN OF DIAMONDS

1991 | d. Nina Menkes

Restored by the Academy Film Archive and The Film Foundation, with funding provided by the George Lucas Family Foundation.

A seminal work by experimental filmmaker Nina Menkes, QUEEN OF DIAMONDS was filmed on location in Las Vegas. Menkes' sister and collaborator, Tinka Menkes, plays an alienated blackjack dealer living and working in Sin City. The film takes a close look at the desolation of daytime Vegas, contrasting the lights, noise, and life of the city to the quiet, lonely reality of its residents. Menkes expresses her unique style through the use of long takes and extended periods of silence to convey her character's solitary life in the Nevada desert.

QUEEN OF DIAMONDS was preserved under the supervision of Nina Menkes using the 35mm original picture negative and 35mm fullcoat magnetic track. The photochemical workflow included the creation of a new 35mm color interpositive and a 35mm internegative at Fotokem in Burbank. The magnetic track was transferred by Endpoint Audio Labs, and restoration and mastering work was done at Audio Mechanics, both in Burbank. A 4K scan of the new interpositive was completed and color corrected under the supervision of Menkes at Illuminate in Hollywood in order to create DCPs in addition to 35mm prints for exhibition. QUEEN OF DIAMONDS had its world restoration premiere at AFI Fest.





THE SECRET CINEMA

1966 | d. Paul Bartel

Restored by the Academy Film Archive and The Film Foundation, with funding provided by the George Lucas Family Foundation.

In Paul Bartel's short film, Jane is completely oblivious to the fact that her life is being filmed. Unbeknownst to her, her boyfriend, colleagues, and therapist all stage and film various parts of her day—to—day activities. The footage is then screened by a film society that runs a "secret cinema." As time goes on, Jane starts to realize that something might be wrong.

THE SECRET CINEMA was preserved using the 35mm original picture and track negatives, found in the vaults at DuArt Lab in New York. The photochemical workflow included the creation of an answer print, a new fine grain master positive, and duplicate negative at Fotokem. The track was transferred by Endpoint Audio Labs, the audio was restored by Audio Mechanics, and a new track negative was shot by DJ Audio. THE SECRET CINEMA had its world restoration premiere at the Music Box Theatre in Chicago.

TUNES OF GLORY

1960 | d. Ronald Neame

Restored by the Academy Film Archive and The Film Foundation in collaboration with Janus Films and The Museum of Modern Art. Restoration funding provided by the George Lucas Family Foundation.

TUNES OF GLORY focuses on the stringent hierarchy of the military and life as a member of the working class, both as an active member of the military and as a civilian. Based closely on the novel of the same name by James Kennaway, Alec Guinness stars as Jock Sinclair, the commanding officer of a peacetime Scottish battalion. When Basil Barrow, played by John Mills, an educated and traditional army man, enters the picture to replace Sinclair, a battle for control of the battalion erupts. The two men compete to win the hearts and loyalty of their unit. Along with Neame's impeccable direction are two powerhouse performances from Guinness and Mills, as well as an outstanding supporting cast.

The restoration of TUNES OF GLORY was completed in collaboration with Janus Films using the 35mm Eastman Color original camera negative and the 35mm original optical track negative on loan from The Museum of Modern Art. 4K scanning and image restoration was completed at FotoKem in addition to the creation of 35mm prints directly from the original camera negative for exhibition. The audio restoration was completed by Audio Mechanics. TUNES OF GLORY had its world restoration premiere at the TCM Classic Film Festival.







THE UNBEARABLE LIGHTNESS OF BEING

1988 | d. Philip Kaufman

Restored by the Academy Film Archive and The Film Foundation, with funding provided by the George Lucas Family Foundation.

Based on the novel by Milan Kundera, THE UNBEARABLE LIGHTNESS OF BEING features Daniel Day—Lewis as Tomas, a surgeon who travels to Prague to perform an operation. While there, he meets Tereza, who soon moves in with him only to find that he is already involved with another woman, Sabina. Tereza grows jealous of Sabina and resents Tomas' infidelity. However, the two eventually marry. Their happiness does not last long as Tomas continues his womanizing ways and Tereza considers leaving him until the Soviet Army invades Czechoslovakia, forcing them to flee to Switzerland. Tereza grows unhappy in their new home and returns to Prague. Tomas realizes his mistake and follows her. Unfortunately, their reunion only leads to more turmoil and misfortune as the couple struggles to stay together and deal with the oppressive new government.

The 35mm original picture negative and a 35mm magnetic track were the primary sources for the digital restoration of THE UNBEARABLE LIGHTNESS OF BEING. The negative includes many scenes that recreate the film's historical feel through optical printing of 16mm sources, as well as introduced effects of dirt and scratches. These sections required special care in order to preserve the intention of the original cinematography. 4K scanning and restoration was completed by Roundabout Entertainment, with audio capture and restoration by Audio Mechanics. THE UNBEARABLE LIGHTNESS OF BEING had its world restoration premiere at the BFI London Film Festival.









CHUMLUM

1964 | d. Ron Rice

Restored by Anthology Film Archives and The Film Foundation, with funding provided by the George Lucas Family Foundation.

Ron Rice's experimental film is 25 minutes of superimpositions, including intricate costumes, beads, satin, and painted faces. The film is accompanied by Angus MacLise's score, which gives it a dreamy and hallucinatory air. Made in 1964, the short is a product of its time, reflecting the atmosphere of the mid–60s.

The goal of the photochemical restoration of CHUMLUM was to create a 16mm-to-35mm blow-up negative from the 16mm single-strand Kodachrome original in order for new 35mm prints to be accessible to audiences. Once the 35mm blow-up internegative was completed by Cineric in New York, the audio restoration began at Audio Mechanics in Burbank from the original optical track negative. A new 35mm optical track negative was created and 35mm composite prints were made. CHUMLUM had its world restoration premiere as part of a complete Ron Rice retrospective at Anthology Film Archives.

THE PRIVATE LIFE OF HENRY VIII

1933 | d. Alexander Korda

Restored by the BFI National Archive and The Film Foundation in association with ITV and Park Circus. Funding provided by the George Lucas Family Foundation.

Alexander Korda's first international success is an entertaining look into the life of the infamous King Henry VIII. Featuring Charles Laughton as King Henry, the film examines five of Henry's six marriages, beginning with Anne Boleyn and ending with Catherine Parr, showing what led to their oftentimes gruesome ends. Korda chooses to focus more on Henry as a man than as a towering historical figure, exploring, as the title suggests, his more human and intimate moments. Korda's foray into the international market is beautifully shot, brilliantly performed, and intelligently written.

After assessing multiple master elements, the 35mm nitrate lavender positive made directly from the original camera negative was identified as the primary image source for the restoration. The element was scanned at the BFI National Archive and the image restoration and grading were done at Dragon Digital in London. The audio restoration was completed at the BFI National Archive's Conservation Centre using a 35mm nitrate sound positive and a safety combined print. THE PRIVATE LIFE OF HENRY VIII had its world restoration premiere at the BFI London Film Festival.







CADAVERI ECCELLENTI [ILLUSTRIOUS CORPSES]

1976 | d. Francesco Rosi

Restored by the Cineteca di Bologna at L'Immagine Ritrovata laboratory and The Film Foundation, with funding provided by the George Lucas Family Foundation.



Based on a novel by Leonardo Sciascia, CADAVERI ECCELLENTI, one of Francesco Rosi's most chilling films, details the political conspiracy surrounding the mysterious deaths of several of Italy's most prominent judges. Police inspector Rogas investigates, looking into everyone from gangsters to leftist terrorists. However, as the case begins to unravel, Rogas finds how far—reaching, sinister, and corrupt the motives are behind the murders. As he delves deeper, he makes the disturbing discovery that they are being performed by agents of the state in order to justify repressive measures, while the Communist party supresses the truth to avoid a revolution.

The 4K digital restoration of CADAVERI ECCELLENTI was carried out at L'Immagine Ritrovata through the use of the 35mm reversal negative and a 35mm SEPMAG, both provided by MGM. A 35mm positive print, supplied by the BFI National Archive, was used as a reference for the editing and the grading.

CAROSELLO NAPOLETANO

1954 | d. Ettore Giannini

Restored by the Cineteca di Bologna at L'Immagine Ritrovata laboratory and The Film Foundation with funding provided by the Hollywood Foreign Press Association

One of the first color films made in Italy and an adaptation of Ettore Giannini's stage musical, CAROSELLO NAPOLETANO begins in the 1950s when a poor singer and his large family are evicted from their tiny home in Naples. Wandering through the streets, a gust of wind blows away his written collection of songs, which sparks the movie into a breathtaking montage of musical sequences through Neapolitan history. Each song is a short vignette, recounting events throughout Italy's history, from the Moorish invasion in the 14th century through the arrival of Americans at the end of World War II. Included in the cast are a young Sophia Loren in one of her first film roles and ballet dancer Léonide Massine.

CAROSELLO NAPOLETANO was restored in 4K at L'Immagine Ritrovata using a separation master positive printed from the original Pathécolor negative provided by Cineteca Nazionale and the original sound negative, preserved by Cineteca di Bologna. A 35mm positive print was supplied by Istituto Luce—Cinecittà as a reference for the editing and for the grading. NEAPOLITAN CAROUSEL had its world restoration premiere at Il Cinema Ritrovato.

De Seta's short masterpieces are dedicated to working—class traditions, such as Sicilian fisherman rowing out to catch swordfish and tuna, miners in dark underground mines, the rituals of harvesters, and Easter parades in Sardinia. They capture the hardship and beauty of a pre—industrial world, which remains a fundamental part of Italian history and society.

The 4K image restoration of the De Seta documentaries was completed using the 35mm original camera negatives for eight of the ten films, and second generation internegatives for the other two. The original sound negatives for each film were utilized for the audio restoration. A previous photochemical restoration made in the 1990s along with a 35mm vintage print, supplied by Cineteca di Bologna, were used as reference for the editing and the picture grading.

ONE MORE SPRING

1935 | d. Henry King

Restored by The Museum of Modern Art and The Film Foundation, with funding provided by the George Lucas Family Foundation.



Based on a novel by Robert Nathan, ONE MORE SPRING is set in Central Park during the Great Depression. A stable in the park becomes home for an unemployed actress, a bankrupt antiques dealer, a Jewish musician in exile from Hitler's Europe, and a banker who defaulted on his depositors. Through a series of unfortunate circumstances, each finds themselves down on their luck and out of options until they discover the stable. Though the film is set during a dark time in U.S. history, King keeps the tone uplifting and comedic, using the friendships and romances that form among four former strangers to imbue the film with sincerity and charm.

A 35mm composite duplicate negative created by MoMA in the 1970s from a nitrate print was the primary source material for the 4K restoration. Image scanning, digital restoration, and color grading was undertaken by ImagePro in Burbank, and the audio restoration was completed by Deluxe in Hollywood. ONE MORE SPRING had its world restoration premiere at Il Cinema Ritrovato.



THE JUNIPER TREE

1990 | d. Nietzchka Keene

Restored by the Wisconsin Center for Film and Theater Research and The Film Foundation, with funding provided by the George Lucas Family Foundation.

THE JUNIPER TREE is an ethereal psychological horror film adapted from the Brothers Grimm fairy tale by American director Nietzchka Keene. Shot in Iceland's stunning volcanic ash landscape, the film features a 20–year old Björk. Set during the Middle Ages, two sisters, Katla and Margit, must find a way to fend for themselves after their mother is burned for being a witch. The oldest sister, Katla, who is also a witch, realizes that the only way they will be able to survive is if she marries. Through witchcraft, she finds Jóhann and makes him fall in love with her. She and Margit think they are safe until Jóhann's son, still mourning the loss of his own mother, figures out Katla's secret, putting the sisters' fate in jeopardy once again.

The restoration of THE JUNIPER TREE utilized the original 35mm picture negative A & B rolls and the original 35mm magnetic soundtrack mix. The 4K digital restoration was completed at Illuminate in Hollywood under the supervision of preservationist Ross Lipman in consultation with cinematographer Randolph Sellars. The audio was digitally restored at Audio Mechanics in Burbank. In addition to the creation of DCPs for exhibition, 35mm prints were produced directly from the original picture negative at FotoKem in Burbank. THE JUNIPER TREE had its world restoration premiere at AFI Fest.



SPECIAL PROJECTS

In 2018, The Film Foundation continued its partnership with Universal Pictures and Twentieth Century Fox. TFF and Universal partnered to restore a selection of the studio's' classic titles, with Martin Scorsese and Steven Spielberg providing their technical expertise. In the first year of this four—year partnership, five titles were restored. TFF is also collaborating with Twentieth Century Fox to restore six films. The first, PATTON, was finished in 2018. TFF also worked with Paramount Pictures and the 3–D Film Archive to restore William Cameron Menzies' horror film THE MAZE in 3–D, using the original left and right eye camera negatives.

NATIONAL FILM PRESERVATION FOUNDATION

NFPF FEDERAL GRANT PROGRAM

Through funds authorized and appropriated by the U.S. Congress under the National Film Preservation Act of 1996, the NFPF grant provides support to libraries, archives, and museums across the United States to create preservation masters and public access copies of orphan films with cultural and historical significance. Under the terms of the legislation, the NFPF is required to raise matching funds from non–governmental entities to sustain its operations; therefore The Film Foundation's support is critical in underwriting these expenses. In 2018, 25 grants were awarded for the preservation of 35 films and to date the NFPF has helped preserve more than 2,404 films at institutions in all 50 states, Puerto Rico, and the District of Columbia.

AVANT-GARDE MASTERS GRANT

The Avant–Garde Masters Grant was created in 2002 with the sole purpose of preserving American experimental film. Often produced with limited funds or commercial prospects, experimental work is the category of filmmaking most threatened by deterioration and loss, making support from the NFPF and TFF essential.

Fully funded by TFF, the grants provide \$50,000 annually for the preservation of avant–garde films. Over the past sixteen years, the initiative has saved 168 works by 65 experimental filmmakers, making these important films available to audiences, in many cases, for the first time in decades. 

ENAMORADA

1946 | Mexico, d. Emilio Fernández

Restored by UCLA Film & Television Archive and The Film Foundation's World Cinema Project in collaboration with Fundacion Televisa AC and Filmoteca de la UNAM. Restoration funded by the Material World Charitable Foundation.

Set during the Mexican Revolution, ENAMORADA is about a rebel general, José Juan Reyes (Pedro Armendáriz), and his troops who occupy the town of Cholula, near Mexico City. Trouble arises when José falls in love with Beatriz (María Félix), the wild and spirited daughter of the richest man in town. The more Reyes tries to court Beatriz, the more she resists in what becomes an amorous game of cat and mouse. As it becomes evident that Reyes' feelings are genuine, Beatriz must make a choice between her comfortable life in Cholula and a dangerous life as the wife of the general. Powerhouse performances from Félix and Armendáriz, stunning cinematography from Gabriel Figueroa, and unforgettable musical performances make ENAMORADA one of Mexico's most beloved films.

The 4K restoration of ENAMORADA utilized the original 35mm nitrate picture and track negatives archived by Televisa at Filmoteca de la UNAM in Mexico City. A 35mm nitrate print, provided by Filmoteca de la UNAM, was also used as a secondary element. 4K scanning and restoration was completed by Roundabout Entertainment, with audio restoration by Audio Mechanics.

The restoration of ENAMORADA had its world premiere at Cannes Classics with an introduction by Martin Scorsese and Olivia Harrison of the Material World Charitable Foundation.

PIXOTE

1980 | Brazil, d. Hector Babenco

Restored by The Film Foundation's World Cinema Project and Cineteca di Bologna at L'Immagine Ritrovata in association with HB Filmes, Cinemateca Brasileira, and JLS Facilitações Sonoras. Restoration funded by the George Lucas Family Foundation.

Inspired in part by Luis Buñuel's LOS OLVIDADOS and Italian Neorealism; based on *A Infância dos Mortos (The Childhood of the Dead Ones)* by José Louzeiro, Hector Babenco's PIXOTE uses a documentary approach to show the unbearably harsh lives of abandoned children who live in poverty and crime in São Paulo. For 11–year old Pixote and the other children on the street, there is no sanctuary from the adults they encounter on either side of the law, as they are used as pawns in criminal acts. After being placed in a juvenile reformatory, Pixote witnesses one brutality after another, and his situation only worsens after he escapes, leaving him with no other option than to try to survive through a life of crime.

PIXOTE was restored using the original camera negative and a first generation internegative preserved at the Cinemateca Brasileira. In order to minimize the overall presence of mold, particularly invasive in reels 3, 5 and 6, the camera negative was wet—gate scanned at 4K resolution. Missing frames in three different shots of reel 3 were replaced using the internegative. The recently rediscovered original magnetic soundtrack, also affected by mold, with the oxide peeling off the base, was carefully repaired by Beto Ferraz, then digitized and restored by José Luiz Sasso (ABC), the re—recording mixer for Hector Babenco in 1981. Final color grading was supervised by cinematographer Rodolfo Sánchez (ABC) using a first generation vintage 35mm print as reference.

The restoration of PIXOTE had its world premiere at Il Cinema Ritrovato with Walter Salles, Roberto Gervitz, and Myra and Janka Babenco in attendance.







PRISIONEROS DE LA TIERRA

1939 | Argentina, d. Mario Soffici

Restored by Cineteca di Bologna at L'Immagine Ritrovata and The Film Foundation's World Cinema Project in association with the Museo del Cine Pablo Ducros Hicken with elements provided by the Cinémathèque Française and the Narodni Filmovy Archiv. Funding provided by the George Lucas Family Foundation.

PRISIONEROS DE LA TIERRA is considered one of the greatest films ever made in Argentina. This powerful and extraordinary film explores social justice issues, showing the harsh working conditions of the Guarani Indians at the yerba mate plantations in northern Argentina. The film examines the struggle between the upper and lower classes, with the Guarani Indians on the bottom of the hierarchy. The Guarani workers have to fight for their rights, and are treated with brutality. In addition to its cinematic achievements, the film is also an important record of the Guarani dialect, which is now virtually lost.

PRISIONEROS DE LA TIERRA was restored using the best existing elements: a first generation 35mm positive print held at La Cinémathèque Française and a recently rediscovered third generation 35mm positive print preserved by the Narodni Filmovy Archiv. For its overall completeness and photographic quality, the first generation 35mm positive print was used to restore the image, while the third generation 35mm positive print was the primary source for sound restoration. A 16mm dupe negative, provided by the Museo del Cine, has been also been studied and compared as a reference. Grading was supervised by Paula Félix Didier, director of the Museo del Cine Pablo Ducros Hicken.

The restoration had its world premiere at Il Cinema Ritrovato with an introduction by Paula Félix Didier.

CHRONIQUE DES ANNÉES DE BRAISE [CHRONICLE OF THE YEARS OF FIRE]

1975 | Algeria, d. Mohammed Lakhdar-Hamina

Restored by The Film Foundation's World Cinema Project and Cineteca di Bologna at L'Image Retrouvée and L'Immagine Ritrovata laboratories. Restoration funded by the George Lucas Family Foundation.

This restoration is part of the African Film Heritage Project, created by The Film Foundation, FEPACI and UNESCO—in collaboration with Cineteca di Bologna—to help locate, restore, and disseminate African cinema.

The second film to be restored through the African Film Heritage Project, CHRONICLE OF THE YEARS OF FIRE is based on events leading up to the 1954 Algerian Revolution and examines the social conditions from the perspective of a local peasant. The story spans a generation—through drought, famine, typhoid, and WWII. The post—war status quo is maintained through manipulation and repression, but also confronted through organized anti—colonial resistance.

CHRONICLE OF THE YEARS OF FIRE was restored in 4K from the original camera and sound negatives and a first generation 35mm interpositive provided by the filmmaker. Three different versions exist of this film. With Mohammed Lakhdar–Hamina's supervision, this restoration reconstructed the version awarded the Palme d'or at the 1975 Cannes Film Festival. The original camera negative, outtakes from that same element, and the interpositive, were made to match a 35mm vintage print of the Director's cut, provided by Lakhdar–Hamina, who also supervised the color grading.

CHRONICLE OF THE YEARS OF FIRE had its world restoration premiere at Il Cinema Ritrovato with Mohammed Lakhdar–Hamina in attendance.

EDUCATION

THE STORY OF MOVIES

In 2018, The Film Foundation introduced "Portraits of America: Democracy on Film," the latest program in the foundation's cinema literacy initiative, *The Story of Movies* (SOM). SOM teaches young people how to understand the visual language of film, with in–depth explorations of classic motion pictures. It also fosters an appreciation for the importance of cinema by placing each film within a cultural and historical context. *The Story of Movies* is available free of charge to middle and high school educators, and to date has been studied by over 10 million students across the U.S.

The new "Portraits of America" curriculum focuses on films that express the ideas embedded in our democratic system, personalizing them with compelling stories about Americans, real and fictional. Through feature films, documentaries, silents, newsreels and animation, the comprehensive lessons investigate how cinema has reflected as well as influenced our perceptions of the ideals and challenges inherent in living in a democratic society. Topics covered in the 8 module, 40 film curriculum include immigration, labor, civil rights, women's issues, the press, the military, and politics.

The press and invited guests screened a presentation conveying the core of the program through edited film clips with narration by Alfre Woodard. The screening was followed by a Q&A with Martin Scorsese; Lee Saunders, President of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME), an SOM partner; Dr. Carla Hayden, the Librarian of Congress; Jeanine Basinger, film studies professor and curator of the Wesleyan Cinema Archives and SOM senior advisor; and Catherine Gourley, the curriculum author of SOM. The panel was moderated by Margaret Bodde.

The new curriculum was then introduced to the education community at the 2018 conference of the American Federation of Teachers (AFT) in July, and the National Council for the Social Studies (NCSS) annual meeting in November; which was attended by over 7200 educators. The foundation also presented three professional development workshops to familiarize educators with the first three modules of the new curriculum. Workshop participants' feedback was invaluable in revising the lesson materials during the last phase of development. Workshops were held in Cleveland, Detroit, and Philadelphia, and featured evening screenings, open to the public as well as teachers, of selected titles from the curriculum.

The "Portraits of America" curriculum will be available to qualified teachers on the *Story of Movies* website (storyofmovies.org), which has been redesigned with a new look and user interface. Educators can download the Teacher's Guides and PowerPoint Presentations for each module, and supplemental film clip reels will also be accessible directly through the website. The new design includes additional ways for the foundation to promote workshops, conferences, and screening events.

RESTORATION FILM SCHOOL & FILM PROJECTION WORKSHOPS

This year, The Film Foundation continued to partner on Restoration Film Schools and AMIA's Film Projection Workshops. In August, a Level 1 projection workshop was held in Chicago, IL, hosted by the Chicago Film Society, University of Chicago Film Studies Center, Reva and David Logan Center for the Arts, and Music Box Theatre. The workshop was attended by 16 projectionists from 14 organizations around the country and as far away as Mexico City (pictured, bottom left). In October, a Level 2 workshop took place in Boston, MA, hosted by Boston Light & Sound, with a class of 12 projectionists. TFF supported two Restoration Film Schools in 2018. The Film Heritage Foundation hosted the fourth Film Preservation & Restoration Workshop India in Kolkata with 57 students (pictured, bottom right), including for the first time participants from Myanmar. To date, more than 200 students have attended these workshops. Over the summer, a FIAF Film Restoration Summer School was held in Bologna, Italy. Forty-eight candidates were selected to take part in theory lectures and practical classes. TFF continued its support of NYU's Audiovisual Preservation Exchange (APEX). This year's was held in June in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. Students from the Moving Image Archiving and Preservation (MIAP) Program worked with colleagues from the Arquivo Geral da Cidade do Rio de Janeiro, Centro Técnico do Audiovisual, Cinemateca do Museu de Arte Moderna, and the Universidad Federal Fluminense to discuss and assess audiovisual projects from cultural heritage organizations, including ones in Argentina, Colombia, Chile, Ghana, Spain, and Uruguay.
